EnrollmentDecreases

Beginning the school year with 1686 studuents, Senior's student body has suffered a decrease of 67 from the previous year.

Sophomores outnumber the juniors and seniors with an enrollment of 717. The senior class follows with 508, while the juniors trail with 461. Compared to last year the number of sophomores nie Waynick; all seniors, and his- has increased while the seniors and juniors have decreased.

Boys outnumber the girls in all but the junior class. The total number of boys is 879 with 377 in the sophomore class, 227 in the junior class, and 275 in the senior class. The sophomore class of girls with 340 outnumbers the junior and senior classes with 234 and 233 respectively. In '59 there were 850 girls in Senior (43 more than there are now) and 903 boys.

If Senior's enrollment is compared to forty years ago, a sonsiderable increase is noted in the number of studuents. In 1920 there were 712 studuents in Senior, the largest enrollment on record up to that time. Out of the 712 students, 125 were junior high pupils, 272 were freshmen, 167 were sophomores, 108 were juniors, and only 60 were seniors. The faculty at this time consisted of 38 teachers.

Senior's present enrollment shows an increase of 974 over the enrollment of 1920. If the Miss Mozelle Causey and Miss junior high and freshman classes Estelle Mtichell are co-sponsors of old Senior are ignored, Senior's increase climbs to 1351.
