Whirlies Take 26-6 Win Over Favetteville Team

Once again showing the power of a Jamieson offense, the Whir-lies marched to a 26-6 victory over the Fayetteville Bulldogs of the Eastern 4-A conference.

In first downs both squads were equal, but that was about as far as the equalty went. On the ground and in the air the Greensboro eleven piled up 312 yards, compared to 204 for the visitors. QB Ralph Lowe handled the situation well, as he tossed two TD aerials and also carried the pigskin to paydirt on the last three yards of an 83 yard drive. Receiver of both of Lowe's scoring passes was junior end Earl Strickland, who took one for a 58 yard scoring play.

Halfback Charlie Ephland, with this game just setting up the tallying drive put himself in the scoring column for his first TD of the season, a three yard dash for the first Whirlie score. He had previously carried the ball 17 yards to the Durham 7, with halfback Steve Davis going the next four.

Second Score

The second Senior score was an 83 yard drive, climaxed by Ralph Lowe's jog from the Bulldog 3 yard line. In this march Ephland carried the ball 25 yards, Steve Davis and QB Lowe 15 each, and halfback Mickey Andrews 12. By halftime the Blue and White had racked up 20 points, the first score being the 58 yard pass play from Lowe to Strickland.

The second half featured a wide array of reserves, as Coach Jamieson was given the opportunity to show the true depth of the Whirlie squad, although the starting eleven remained in the third period to boost the 20 point total another six. This was on a pass from Lowe to Strickland, a 31 yard pitch and run play.

Scoring the lone Fayetteville TD was Bulldog Halfback Larry Sessons, who dived over from the GHS two yard line after a march sparked by the visitor's pilot, Danny Townsend
