The students are Bob Groat, Jayne Marsh, Dan Richman, Dale Stansbury, and Bill Tippet.

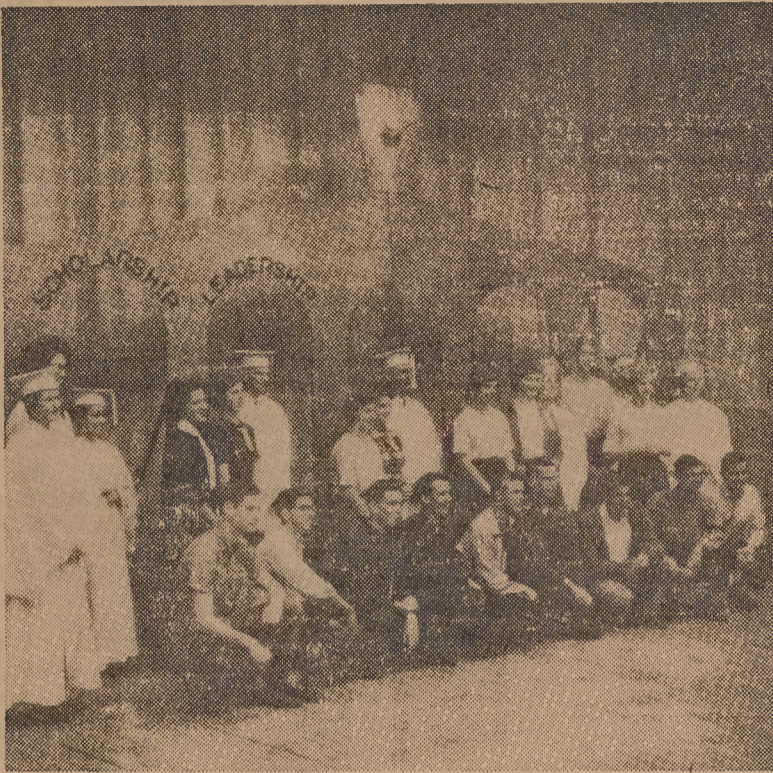
Semifinalists and commended students together constitute less than two per cent of all high school seniors. Senior High has twelve semifinalists.
