Book Week was first created in 1919 by Franklin K. Mathiews, Librarian for the Boy Scouts of America and a writer of books for boys, and Frederick G. Melcher, a publisher and editor. Inexpensive editions of standard boys' books were made available, combining the dime store novels and the "penny dreadful."
