The American Bandmasters Asociation, which has been holding ts annual convention in Greensooro this week, will elect officers or the coming year at its final business meeting tomorrow morning at 10:00. The present president, Mr. Earl Slocum, will preside over the elections to be held n the Ball Room of the King Cotten Hotel.

Mr. Slocum is currently the director of the University of North Carolina Band. He has held this position since the early 1930's. Immediately prior to this time, he was the director of the Greensboro Senior High School Orchestra for approximately four years. Mr. Slocum left Senior to accept the position at UNC. He was elected president of the Association at the 1962 convention which was held at Purdue University at Lafayette, Indiana.



The number of units required for graduation has been increased from seventeen to eighteen by adding a second unit in social studies. The requirement now stipulates two units in social studies, one of which must be American History. The second unit may be acquired in any history and social studies courses normally offered in grades nine through twelve.

Two years of physical education are now required in grades nine through twelve in order to receive one unit of credit required for graduation. The currently required course in health and physical education is a prerequisite to the second course, which will be strictly physical activity.
