VESPERS SERVICE

Speaking at the Vespers Service, on May 30 is the Reverend Joe Garrison, minister at the

Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, serving since 1945 as its pastor.

Active in many civic organizations, including the Greensboro Council on Alcoholism, Reverend Garrison has authored two books entitled *Heads Up for College* and *Understanding Books of the New Testament, "The Gospels."*

Before coming to Greensboro, Reverend Garrison was the Presbyterian University Pastor at the University of Missouri and pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Columbia, Missouri. He was also named the Director of Student Work for the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church and has served as an exchange pastor with the Queen's Cross Church in Aberdeen, Scotland.

GRADUATION

A North Carolina native, Reverend Robert L. Moore, will deliver the address for graduation. Reverend Moore is the present Minister of Youth at the West Market Street Methodist Church where he is responsible for Junior High Senior High and College youth.

While at Duke University, where he studied classical Greek, Reverend Moore was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and Eta Sigma Phi, a national honorary fraternity for outstanding scholarship in the study of languages.

Reverend Moore acts as Chaplain of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of which he is a member and advises the Grimsley Senior High Huddle Group of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.
