In order to be eligible for membership in the Society, a student must have at least a 3.4 cumulative grade point average. A list of these students is then sent to the faculty members who vote for the students of their choice. The final decision is made by a selection committee composed of Grimsley Principal Mr. Glenn, guidance counselors, and department chairpersons. They judge the students with the highest number of votes from the faculty on character, leadership, scholarship, and service -- the four qualities of a Torchlight member.

Torchlight induction are held twice a year, in the fall and in the spring.

Presently, Torchlight members are busy concluding their fundraising project, a pecan sale, which began in November and which has thus far been highly successful. The profits from this venture go toward scholarships which are awarded annually on the basis of need, desire, and the four Torchlight qualities.

Chris Evergreen Competition Begins; Four GHS Service Clubs Participate wins \$50, the second place

Eight local high school service clubs have entered the Greensboro Youth Council's Chris Evergreen Competition and are competing for a first prize of \$200 and the right to advance tonational competition for ecological activities.

The purpose of the firstyear project, according to GYC Youth coordinator Lea Spencer, is to involve high school youth actively in ecological projects that provide a community service and are environmentally beneficial.

Clubs compete for cash prizes and awards by sponsoring, organizing, and running an approved Chris Evergreen project. Some of the projects run by Grimsley service clubs include decorating bird trees in neighborhoods, cleaning the grounds at the Thompson children's School, writing a children's story and telling it in nursery schools, and planting pine trees at Grimsley.

All approved projects mut be operated between November 27 and December 25. Club project chairmen will submit their Chris Evergreen project notebooks for judging by January 12, and on January 30 winners will be announced at an awards program.
