Obesity rates skyrocket

Last year in 31 states, obesity rates continued to rise with no sign of decline. Mississippi was the first state to cross the 30 percent barrier for adults categorized as obese. According to a research report by the Trust for America's Health, a research group that specializes in disease prevention, Alabama and West Virginia states were trailing behind. The leanest state in the nation was Colorado with an obesity rate of 17.6 percent.

According to health officials, the recent statistics reveal that the nation is facing a public health crisis. "Unfortunately, we're treating it like a mere inconvenience instead of the emergency that it is," said Dr. James Marks, senior vice president at the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, a philanthropy devoted to improving health care.

SAT scores dropping

The College Board recently reported that the Class of 2007 averaged the lowest math and reading scores since 1999. Out of approximately 800 points, last spring's high school seniors had an average score of 502 on the critical reading section. The math scores took a three-point dive from an average score of 518 to 515.

Latinos and Blacks have lagged behind producing a continuous gap between SAT scores registered by White students.

There was a 6 percent increase in the number of Black students taking the ACT, while students identified as "Other Hispanic, Latino, or Mexican Americans or Puerto Ricans) rose more than 25 percent.
