The ring was officially accepted after it had been passed by the four classes, Alpha Kappa Gamma, national leadership fraternity, and Dr. Frazer.

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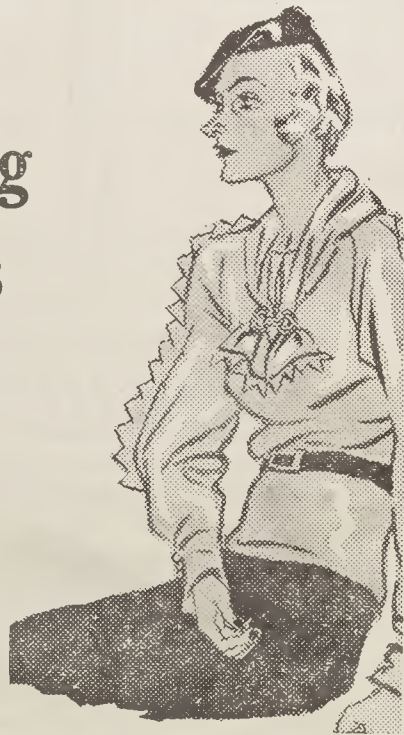
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
