The general theme of the convention program, as planned by Miss Edith Searles, national president of the association, and Dr. Evelyn Miller, dean of women at Alegheny College, was "The Philosophy of Student Government." Four principal speakers from various colleges spoke on the following subjects: Professor Sarah M. Sturtevant, Columbia University, "The Function of Student Government, on the Modern College Camjus"; Dean Thyresa Amos, University of Pittsburgh, "The Educational Value of Extra-curricula *ctivities Among College Women Students"; Dean Florence Micolon Ohio Wesleyan University, "Personality Adjustments Among College Women Students"; and Dean Karl Leobrick, Syracuse University, "The Place of the Honor System in Modern Student Government."
