After discussing the enviable places in the community that a woman might have, Mrs. McGeachy brought out ways of attaining these places in society, in postering art, music intellectual and moral endeavors. First of all, she said, too much emphasis cannot be put on a pleasing personal appearance which overrules timidity. Good manners, which are the consistent consideration of other persons' feelings, also help. The main thing is to decide what contribution you want to make to the community in which you go, and strive toward it.
