Talk On Courtesy

During the Freshman chapel period on Thursday, Miss Alma Edwards gave a talk on "Campus Courtesy."

First, Miss Edwards stated the purpose of a college education, including various reasons for entering a college. She spoke, then, of some of the by-products of an education and of some of the values which women should expect from a college education. She said, "Women today should be able to earn a living, though that is not a sufficient reason for seeking an education. They are to make and to preside over homes where a healthy happy family life is to develop."

Women should learn to participate more often in civic life and the obligations of citizenship. Miss Edwards advised a wise use of leisure time to develop more dynamic personality.

She turned then to some of the more intimate phases of our campus life here at Queens. "Courtesy," she declared, "is not an overnight mushroom growth. It comes out of a genuine respect for, first of all, our own selves, and, then for the rights of our fellows. We exhibit its presence or absence in every turn we make." This is revealed in our quiet speech, our laughter, our dress, our generosity to our roommates; in short, with all contacts with family and students.

Phi Mu Second; Others Following Exceptionally Close Behind

The six national sororities of Queens-Chicora have begun their race for the annual scholarship cup which is given for the sorority attaining the highest scholastic average. At the beginning of the second semester the Chi Omega sorority is surging ahead by having the only Merit average on the campus. This sorority is leading by having 1.762 Quality Points per semester hours.
