In the totaling of points submitted by Miss Mary Denny and Miss Thelma Albright, instructors in English and committee of judging, along with those of Dr. Stout, the freshman paper was five points ahead of the sophomore issue.

From the business standpoint, the sophomores cleared twelve dollars and the freshmen, thirty dollars.

The sophomores, said Dr. Stout, are to be commended for their better make-up and headlines, while the freshmen contribution to citizenship and features were good.
