

Monologist Will Perform

Cornelia Otis Skinner, Famous Actress, Writer, and Monologist will give a performance of her Original Character Sketches at Piedmont Junior High School Auditorium on Thursday, October 19th at 8:15 P. M.

Traveling throughout the United States, Miss Skinner has presented her Original Sketches and Solo Performances in many leading cities. Noted for such varied characters as The Wives of Henry VIII, she has the uncanny ability of making her audience feel the very presence of the characters impersonated. Miss Skinner also contributes poetry to outstanding magazines of this and other countries.

Treating comedy and tragedy, writing and acting with equal perfection, Miss Skinner is one of the greatest living monologists. Her education included studies for the stage with Societaires of Comedie Francaise.

Miss Skinner's appearance in this city is being sponsored by the Charlotte Branch of the American Association of University Women and by Queens-Chicora College. General admission will be seventy-five cents; reserved seats may be obtained for a dollar and fifty cents.
