

Under the sponsorship of the Charlotte Branch of the American Association of University Women and Queens-Chicora College Cornelia Otis Skinner performed Thursday night at the Piedmont Junior High Auditorium in a program of her original monologue.

Miss Skinner is the gifted daughter of Otis Skinner, the well-known and loved stage veteran. From her earliest days she moved stageward. After attending Bryn Mawr she went abroad to study at the Sorbonne and under versity campuses.
