The Delta Psi chapter was founded at Queens-Chicora on May 6, 1939.

Then the qualifications for membership were announced by Miss Mary Inglis, of the Business Department. To be eligible for membership in this organization a student must have been enrolled in the college for at least one quarter, must have a high school certificate or the equivalent, and must have a per cent of ninety in all college studies. Members are also chosen in regard to leadership, character, and service.
