Stunts To Be Given Tuesday

Curriculum Is Announced

J. M. Godard, dean of instruction, has announced the one semester courses before the Christmas holidays. Definite dates, Mr. Godard said, would be announced on the bulletin board.

Courses open to Juniors and Seniors include:

Bible 30B, "Jeremiah and Revelation"—Dr. Gettys.

French 46B, "French Conversation"—Dr. Delano.

Economic Geography—Mr. Kennedy.

English 42B, "Tennyson and Browning"—Dr. Stout.

English 21A, "The Short Story"—Miss Tillett (this does not count on an English major, however, but it does count as elective credit.)

In the field of education will be offered:

"Educational Psychology."

"Classroom Management."

"Primary Methods."

"Practice Teaching."

The customary courses for the second semester will be offered in Home Economics including courses in Mrs. Eastham's "Advanced Clothing," which was begun last year. Mrs. Eastham will also conduct courses in "Household Physics." Mrs. Booker will teach "Institutional Food Study" and "Family Relations."

In the field of business department, Miss English will have classes in "Secretarial Administration," "Office Management" and "Office Practice." There is a possibility that a course in "Commercial Law" may be offered.

In the mathematic department, Miss Jones will offer Math 40A if there is sufficient demand. Miss Van will conduct a class in statistics.

Dr. Byrd will teach Economics 3A, "Economic Problems"; Government 30B; Philosophy 3B, "Modern Philosophy."

In Biology, Miss Nooe will teach "Hygiene" and Dr. Howe "Genetics," "Local Flora," and "Field Botany." In Art, Mrs. Huffman will continue her "Art Appreciation," courses which may be entered second semester even if the student has not had the first semester work, also Mrs. Huffman will offer a course in "Art and Industry."

Dr. Abernathy will teach "Experimental Psychology," "Mental Hygiene," and "Systems of Psychology."

The customary courses will be offered in the Music Department. Students may enter the second semester of "History of Music" without having had the first semester.

Radio Program

The weekly Queens-Chicora radio program at 7:00 Thursday night featured last time Miss Mary Wharton's piano pupils.

Four Classes Will Perform

The annual Queens-Chicora College Stunt night will be held in the college auditorium Tuesday evening.

Stunt, which is held in November of each year, is sponsored by the athletic association of the college. Martha Stoner of Elberton, Ga., is president of the athletic association. Miss Cordelia Henderson, head of the physical education department of the college, is the faculty advisor.

Each of the four classes at the college will be allowed to give a skit lasting not more than fifteen minutes. Each class will have a gallery to support the members of the cast for the skit. The galleries will sing songs in keeping with the themes of the skits.

Judges from the city will select the winning stunt. The stunts will be judged on the basis of originality, acting, costumes, scenery, co-operation, etc. The class being judged as presenting the best skit will be given custody of a silver loving cup for one year. The name of the class and its year of graduation will be engraved on the cup.

Last year the class of '41, this year's junior class, won the cup. Elizabeth Brammer of Christiansburg, Va., was chairman of the stunt. Mary Payne of Charlotte was the gallery chairman.

Henrietta McIver of Gulf is the stunt chairman for the senior class this year. The gallery chairman is Frances Stough of Cornelius.

The junior class stunt chairman and gallery chairman respectively are Elizabeth Brammer and Mary Payne.

Cookie Scoggin of Conway is the stunt chairman for the sophomore class and Jane Watt Montgomery of Reidsville is the gallery chairman.

Chairman of the freshman class stunt is Anne Wiley of Charlotte. Ruth Kilgo of Charlotte is gallery chairman.
