Name New Queens New Asst. Dean

Pfohl Heads Music

Trustees of Queens College in their fall meeting changed the name of the institution to Queens College, elected James Christian Pfohl of Davidson College director of music for 1940-41, and elected an assistant dean of women to begin her duties the first of February.

Professor Pfohl will continue to give the major part of his time to Davidson College but will direct a co-operative program between music departments of the two colleges in an effort to bring about expansion of the music department at Queens. Details of the arrangement whereby he will serve both institutions will be worked out by executives of the col-

In discussing the change in the college's name, officials pointed out that the motion for this action was made and seconded by trustees from South Carolina. Chicora College of Columbia was merged with Queens in 1930. An item of the basis for consolidation read: "That, for the time being, the name of Queens-Chicora College shall be adopted and the new board of trustees, as provided for in this agreement, shall be vested with authority, if in their discretion they deem it advisable, to change the name of the institution, taking into consideration the good will and heritage of the affiliated colleges."

It was also decided by trustees that Dr. Blakely, who began his duties as president in the summer, shall be inaugurated at the next commencement exercises.
