# 361 Employees Get Christmas Checks

Three hundred and sixty-one employees of the Caromount and Wilson Divisions were happy on December 3, 1948 when they received Christmas Savings Club <sup>checks</sup> which totaled \$48,571.15. The Christmas Savings plan was begun early in 1947 through arrangements made with the Planters National Bank and Trust Co. In Rocky Mount and The National Bank of Wilson.

The idea was to encourage thrift and provide through small weekly payroll deductions a sizable sum on tor the inevitable Christmas shopthe ping.

The employees of Caromount and Wilson liked the idea and for the first year of its operation 316 employees participated. In 1948 Ett this number had increased to 361. In Wilson 27 employees received checks amounting to \$3,876.75 and in Caromount \$44,694.40 were distributed to 334 workers. The savings plan is optional and the amount designated by the employee was deducted weekly from the employee's check by the pay <sup>foll</sup> department as a service to emlaple ployees.
