New Faces

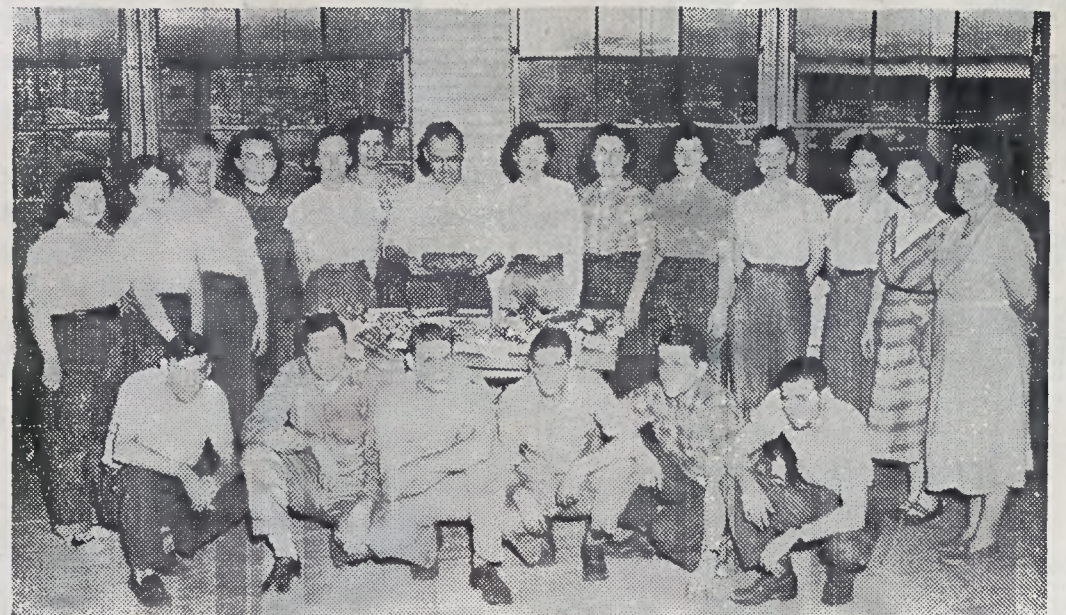
