Combat Heat With Salt

Excessive loss of body salt through perspiration is the chief cause of heat sickness. This can be remedied by replacing the salt. The most convenient method is to take salt tablets. Special processes have been developed whereby each salt crystal in the tablet is coated. When swallowed this tablet dissolves slowly after reaching the stomach and does not cause the nausea and digestive disorders usually noticed with the taking of plain salt.

These special salt tablets have been placed throughout the mill near water fountain. It is recommended that these tablets be taken four to six times daily depending on the need.
