#### Elizabeth Anne Brake

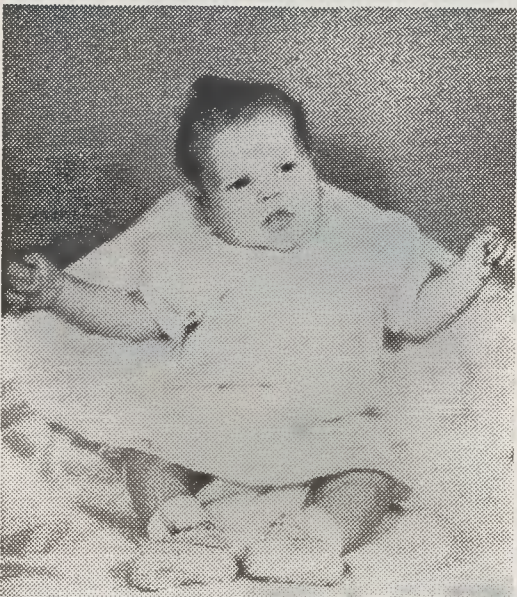
