The ECHO staff dedicates the December issue to the Tuberculosis Control Program, by placing its chief emphasis upon the need of purchasing Christmas Seals by all the *Citizens of Our Town*.

To secure knowledge at first hand concerning the needs of our town and community in the program of controlling tuberculosis, several members of the staff visited the Health Department recently. The group was received pleasantly and given all available pamphlet material to be used in study at school in order to get information on the needs of our community to have it carried in to every home from which Lincoln High School students come.

The group followed up their visit to the Health Department by inviting in for interview Mrs. Edith Brocker, Supervisor of Nurses, and Mr. Joseph H. Huff, Health Educator for the District Health Association, which includes the Chapel Hill area.

During the interview, the students learned many facts about the advances in the knowledge of tuberculosis and its control since 1914. Too, they were told much that the school and the community can do to educate the public on the matter of controlling tuberculosis.

Mock Election Held

The 7th B class had a mock election to elect the president and vice president of the United States at the same time that citizens throughout America were voting.

We registered two Mondays, October 20, and October 27. The pupils who were absent at the time we registered were not allowed to vote on November 4.
