

Wheat Quota Vote Set For May 2nd.

Enough wheat on hand to supply the nation's normal domestic needs and exports for two years is the prospect wheat growers are facing as they prepare to vote on marketing quotas for 1942 on Saturday, May 2, according to W. Herbert White, Caswell County farmer and a member of the State AAA Committee.

Mr. White said the nation's wheat supply on July 1, 1942 is estimated at 1,423,000,000 bushels on the basis of a July 1, 1942, carryover of 650,000,000 bushels and a 1942 yield of 793,000,000 bushels. This is the largest supply of wheat on record, almost 100,000,000 bushels more than a year ago, he said.

"American farmers never have produced less than 500,000,000 bushels of wheat in any year since 1890," he said. "Last year we used about 700,000,000 bushels of wheat, including exports. Our surplus of wheat has been increased within the past few years by sudden and drastic curbing of exports by tighter war and economic blockades and per acre yields above normal. Present indications, therefore, are that we need not worry about having enough wheat to supply our demands and those of our allies."

Mr. White pointed out that the quota program provides for production of enough wheat, which together with carryover, will supply domestic and export needs with a 30 percent margin for safety. Under existing legislation, quotas must be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture on any of the basic crops whenever the total supply exceeds a normal

year's domestic consumption and exports by more than 35 percent. To be in effect, however, quotas must be approved by at least a two thirds majority in a national referendum.

He declared all wheat growers who have planted for harvest more than 15 acres of wheat and whose normal production is 200 bushels or more are eligible to vote in the referendum.

Details of places and time of voting may be obtained from AAA committeemen or at county AAA offices, he said.



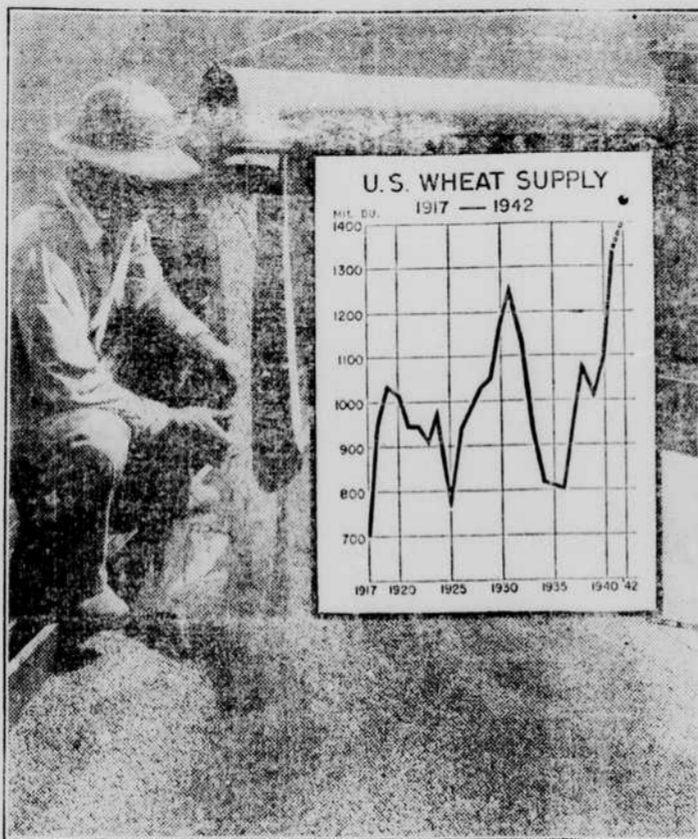
STATE COLLEGE ANSWERS TIMELY FARM QUESTIONS

QUESTION—Why are peanuts so important in meeting the Food for Victory goals?

ANSWER—Because, peanuts normally will yield three times as much oil per acre as cotton, and twice as much oil per acre as soybeans, says Dr. I. O. Schnaub, director of the State College Extension Service. Vegetable oils are badly needed due to the loss of imports of these products from combat zones of the war. In an emergency, peanut oil can be substituted for other oils that are used in making explosives, anti-freeze and medicines.

U. S. Wheat Bins Are Full



World War II finds the United States well supplied with wheat, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. As the chart indicates, the supply is double that of 1917 when America entered the first World War. It is estimated that on July 1, the Nation's supply will be nearly 1 1/2 billion bushels, enough for two years of domestic use. Instead of plowing up new land and expanding wheat acreage, farmers are able to use land, labor, and equipment in turning out other war commodities more vitally needed—such as dairy, poultry, and meat products, vegetables, and oil crops.

should be grown on each farm for home needs?

ANSWER—Three to five acres of wheat will furnish cereal and flour for the average family at much less cost than the cost of bought cereals and flours, says Miss Mary E. Thomas, Extension nutritionist of State College. A bushel of wheat provides approximately 600 servings—enough to insure a good breakfast cereal and other whole wheat products for an average family for a period of three or four months.

QUESTION—When is the best time to plant soybeans?

ANSWER—A planting calendar, prepared by E. C. Blair, Extension agronomist of State College, lists April 15 to July 1 as the planting dates for soybeans in the Coastal Plain and Piedmont, and May 15 to June 15 as the soybean planting season in the mountains. Blair recommends that 15 to 45 pounds of seed be used per acre when
