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Food Chain To Aid Dixie Yam Growers

NEW YORK, April 30--An intensive eight day sales drive to further reduce existing surpluses of North Carolina sweet potatoes has been started by the A and P. Tea Company which during a similar drive in March boosted its purchases to 25,230 bushels, an increase of 74.2 per cent over the corresponding period last year, in assisting growers of the South to market their high quality but excessive supplies.

Southern sweets are being pushed in supermarkets and stores of the chain all over the country from April 24 through May 2 at the request of growers who still find their potato houses overstocked. The U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates a surplus of 1,500,000 bushels in the yam growing odar mb odar mbm mb growing areas.

The department says that North Carolina potato houses are now stocked with 300,000 bushels -- a surplus second only to that of Georgia. This surplus is from the 1941 crop of 6,880,000 bushels. In

1940 the Tarheel State produced 7,178,000 bushels.

A survey of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the Department of Agriculture indicates that North Carolina's 1942 crop will be equal to that of last year.
