We have learned that no nation liveth unto itself alone - that because we tried to live alone, walking out on the world, we had to pass through a period of distress before we could again have a chance to help establish the kind of world in which we want to live.

A lesson came out of the last war. We have been long in learning it and our education has been costly but we can at least say in the words of Kipling, after another war, "Let us admit it fairly as a business people should. We have had no end of a lesson. It will do us no end of good."


