The "willing" method of making grass silage, without the use of molasses or acid preservatives requires that the moisture content of the chopped material be reduced below 68 per cent.

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics has advised hog producers not to increase breeding in the 1943 fall pig crop more than 15 percent over the number of fall pigs raised in 1942.
