General Directions for Care of Waffle Irons: When the waffle iron is new heat it for 10 minutes with grids open and then turn off the current. While it is warm brush top and bottom grids with a vegetable oil (Wesson, Mazola, Olive, Pluffs or Peanut Oil.) Cool the iron.

close grids and allow iron to remain idle for at least 24 hours.

## When You Wish to Bake Waffles:

Preheat iron with grids open until heat is uncomfortable to the touch of the hand, close, complete preheating of iron according to manufacturers time suggestion. To remove excess grease from grids bake a 'dummy waffle' by adding 3 tsp. baking powder to a half cup of regular batter. Discard the dummy waffle and turn the remaining batter into waffles, and remember:

1. To use enough batter to touch top grid.
2. Use full amount of shortening called for in standard recipes so as to have grids greased regularly.
3. If waffles stick, the iron has been too hot or is too cool. So study your iron.
4. When finished cool iron with grids open.
5. Do not wash.

If iron gets to sticking or needs a house cleaning rub grids vigorously with stiff wire brush and dry steel wool, then follow same treatment as for new iron.

To clean outside rub warm iron with a soft cloth which has been in a vegetable oil, or use silver polish on a cooled iron.

## Other Useful Suggestions for Waffle Iron:

Corn Fritters, Cheese Waffles, Toasted Sandwiches, Short Cake, French Toast, Nut and Fruit Waffles and Gingerbread.

Good Quick Waffles:  
2 c. flour  
1 tsp. salt  
3 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. sugar  
5 tbs. butter, or shortening  
1 3-4 c. milk  
2 eggs  
Sift together dry ingredients and cut in the shortening. Put whole eggs with milk and beat. Add liquid mixture to dry ingredients and blend.

Brown Sugar Syrup:  
1 c. light brown sugar  
1-4 c. water  
1-4 tsp. cinnamon  
2 tsp. butter  
Cook together to the consistency of maple syrup. Remove from heat and add 1-2 tsp. vanilla.

Virginia Waffles:  
1 1-2 c. boiling water  
1 1-4 tbs. baking powder  
1 1-2 c. milk  
3 c. flour  
3 tbs. sugar  
1-2 c. white corn meal  
1 1-2 tsp. salt  
2 egg yolks  
2 egg whites  
4 tbs. melted butter  
Cook meal in boiling water 20

Ham Waffles --  
3-4 c. flour  
3 tsp. baking powder  
1-2 tsp. salt  
1 c. milk  
Mix in order given  
2 eggs  
4 tbs. butter  
6 tbs. chopped or ground ham.
