ed. Cool. Pour into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue made by beating two egg whites. When whites begin to stiffen add two tablespoons sugar slowly. Bake 350 degrees 10-12 min.

Quick Lemon Pie

1 can sweetened condensed milk (15 oz.)
2 lemons - juice
Grated rind of one
2 egg yolks
Mix slightly beaten egg yolks, lemon juice, rind and milk. Stir until it thickens. Do not cook. Pour into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue made by beating two egg whites until they begin to thicken, add two tablespoons sugar gradually. Bake at 350 degrees 10-12 minutes.

Pastry

1 cup flour
6 Tbs. fat
1-4 tsp. salt
2 or 3 Tbs. water
Sift flour and salt. Cut in fat until a grainy consistency. Add water, using only enough to hold dough together. Press together with fingers. Roll out on board. Fold three times, roll again and repeat once more. Line an 8 inch pie pan. Prick with fork. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven 450 degrees.

If pastry is cut about 1/2 inch larger than pie pan, and edge folded under, then fluted with fingers, the result will be a better looking crust, and it will have a more substantial edge.

20 Fellowships Are Offered At State

Raleigh, April 11--Twenty fellowships worth \$1070.00 each have been made available at N. C. State College to qualified women by the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Company. It was announced today by Dr. W. G. Van Note, coordinator of the Pratt and Whitney Program at the College.

The fellowships are designed to prepare young college graduates who have no prior technical background for positions as engineering aides in Pratt and Whitney's Hartford, Conn., Aircraft plants, and they cover all tuition, fees, books, instruments, board, lodging and laundry as well as giving an additional cash stipend of \$25 per month. The course of study includes fundamentals in mathematics, engineering drawing, engineering physics, metallurgy, aircraft engines, machine shop practices, experimental statistics and mechanical engineering laboratory.

Dr. Van Note said:

Successful candidates for the fellowships must be young ladies who have completed a four year college course, preferably since 1937. They must be American citizens in good health and should bring with them a birth certificate. Upon enrolling at State College, each girl will be given a physical examination by the College physician at the expense of Pratt and Whitney. In accepting a fellowship, each fellow agrees to Pratt and Whitney an option on her services for a one year period. Dr. Van Note explained:

Upon entering the plant at the conclusion of the College program monthly earnings will be approximately \$150, and pay raises will be forthcoming as experience and training proceed.

State College received its initial group of 20 fellowships last June and the first class will complete

the courses prescribed at the end of the present school term on May 29th.

Dr. Van Note now is receiving applications for the fellowships. Interested persons should contact him in the Mechanical Engineering Department at State College. Last year he canvassed most of the women colleges in North Carolina plus other schools in South Carolina and Tennessee for candidates.

In addition to State College, eight other leading educational institutions in the nation are carrying on the Pratt and Whitney Program. They are the University of New Hampshire; Brown University; Syracuse university; Michigan State College; University of Illinois; and the university of Wisconsin.

Even with sugar rationing it's possible to have homemade desserts. They should be considered as part of the meal and not as something extra. They can help in getting the "Basic Seven" foods daily if we will plan them so that they are not just "something sweet."

Fruit desserts are always good, whether served as they are, such as berries, sliced orange, peaches, etc., or canned. Cooked fruit in such forms as baked apples, fruit cobbler and fruit pies, are also very delicious and nutritious desserts.

Desserts made with milk and eggs are especially valuable as they contribute to the protein intake. Also they are a good way to use the required amount of milk for the family, if they do not care to drink it.

Peanut Butter Pie

1-2 c. sugar
2 Tbs. flour
1-4 tsp. salt
2 c. milk
egg yolks
1-2 c. peanut butter
Combine sugar, flour and salt. Add milk and stir until smooth. Cook in double boiler until it begins to thicken. Pour over slightly beaten egg yolks, stirring constantly. Cook slowly until mixture coats spoon. Add peanut butter, mix well and cook until thickened.
