

Looking Over Our District's Health

For the past few days the Nurses have gone into every high school in the county and tuberculin skin tested all students. Films on tuberculosis have been shown, talks have been given and educational materials distributed in an effort to show the students the tuberculosis problem in our county, and how they may help in the fight against this disease. Those students who react positively will have an X-ray picture taken.

We have arranged for the X-ray technician from the North Carolina State Sanatorium to work in the county during the last week in November for the purpose of taking the X-ray pictures, which will then be sent to Dr. P. P. McCain at the State Sanatorium for his interpretation. There will be a charge of one dollar for each film, but if you do not feel able to pay for this service the fee will be paid by the Halifax County Tuberculosis Association from the money derived from the sale of Tuberculosis Seals. This charge represents the actual cost of the material used, for there is no charge made by this department or the State Sanatorium.

I wish to call to your attention that a positive test does not indicate that the child has tuberculosis, but on the other hand simply means that further study is necessary. Please do not become alarmed because your child has a positive test, for we will notify you if there is evidence of disease shown by the X-ray.

For the past two Wednesdays at ten forty five A. M. over Station W. C. B. T. Miss Rob Cherry, Home Economics teacher in the Roanoke Rapids High School, and several students have presented radio programs on the life of Dr. Edward Trudeau, early pioneer in the field of Tuberculosis. This week Miss Katie Speer, teacher in the Aurelian Springs High School, and a group of students in the Community Health Service Course presented a program describing this new and practical course. Be sure and tune in next Wednesday ten forty five A. M. over Station regular weekly broadcast of the Health Department and hear Miss Josephine Johnson and a group of students from the Roanoke Rapids High School present a program of Thanksgiving music.

Mountain Test Farm At Swannanoa Officially Closed

Raleigh, November 16th-- Fred E. Miller, director of the Test Farms division of the State Department of Agriculture reported that the Mountain Test Farm at Swannanoa has been officially closed, and pointed out that the new Mountain Test Farm will be situated at Waynesville.

Dean Colvard, assistant director in charge of the Mountain Test Farm has moved to Waynesville and will make his home in Waynesville until his dwelling has been constructed for him on the new farm. Miller said that construction is well under way on the poultry plant and the modern barn at the Mountain Experiment Station. He said that State Highway Commission has assured the Department of Agriculture that the farm will be connected to the Waynesville street system by newly constructed roads.

AAA Election To Be Held Nov. 21st.

AAA election meetings will be held in 26 communities of Halifax County on November 21, according to C. L. Kelly, Vice-chairman of the county AAA committee.

That means that farmers will be voting for approximately 78 regular AAA community committeemen and 32 alternate committeemen. Because of this election's significance and extensiveness it is perhaps well that voting farmers be reminded of the duties of the men from whom they will vote."

Mr. Kelly listed these general responsibilities of AAA community committeemen determine local conservation needs and help farmers plan their AAA conservation practices, help with farm war and re-conversion plans, conduct referenda when needed, help with marketing quota programs, assist with loans and other price supporting measures, help with programs dealing with equipment, feeds, transportation, surplus war property and other emergency programs.

"In general, committeemen help their neighbors in complying with and getting the full benefit of AAA programs, enlisting the help and support of all local organizations and agencies to get the job done. To do the best job possible, those elected should have the support coming from a large participation in the community elections," he added.

Although earlier seedings are preferable for most small grains, there is still time to seed some crops, says Dr. E. R. Collins, Extension agronomist.

"Paper War" Far From Won

The American Newspaper Publishers Association has released a resume of facts and opinions gathered from key Federal officials in the interest of newspapers supporting the pulpwood and waste paper campaign.

The ANPA inquiry uncovered the following significant facts pointing to a continuing demand for pulpwood long after the defeat of the Nazis:

1. Military requirements for paper and paperboard are now at a wartime peak.
2. Allied military supplies new in Europe, including those of the British, must be repackaged before being shipped to Pacific combat area.
3. Liberated countries, such as France, Belgium and Holland, are making large demands on this country for paper.
4. The Army expects no severe cut back in military requirements for paper and paperboard for six months after V-E Day.

This is but further evidence of the fact that the "paper war" isn't yet over and that the need for pulpwood is far from filled. We have many miles and months to go in the Pacific despite our glorious naval victories.

Cut all the pulpwood you can. But cut the kind of pulpwood the mills specify in order to avoid a waste of time, effort and transportation equipment.

To encourage the harvesting of more seed, a purchase and loan program for winter cover crop seed harvested in 1945 will be undertaken by the Commodity Credit Corporation and operated as in 1944.

In the first nine months of this year, North Carolina poultryman produced 871 million eggs, standing twentieth in the nation but fourth along the Atlantic seaboard.

To attain high employment goals after the war, C. B. Hutchison, president of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities, calls for "greatly expanded world trade and for international currency stabilization with more cooperation among nations."
