The two judges voting to uphold segregation were Judges John J. Parker and George B. Timmerman. Dissenting was Judge J. Waties Waring, a South Carolinian.

Although the court upheld segregation, it granted by a unanimous decision an injunction to equalize school facilities within South Carolina and ordered to report back within six months on what had been done toward that end.

The dissent of Judge Waring was hailed by many as one of the most eloquent ever rendered.



Cheek is a graduate of Shaw University, class of 1950 and is described as quiet and wellmannered. He draws \$215 per month as principal of the Jeffrey's Grove School. Prior to at-(Please turn to Page Eight)
