Highway Patrol Cracks Down

RALEIGH - The Highway Patrol began targeting aggressive drivers on North Carolina interstates Wednesday and will continue through the Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

Aggressive drivers are identified as those who flagrantly violate the motor vehicle laws by excessive speeding, following too closely, erratic lane changes, safe move-ment violations and other forms of reckless endangerment. Aggressive drivers, state records say, account for a significant number of the traf-fic collisions on state roadways.

This high-volume holiday travel period is traditionally one of our busiest and deadliest," said Colonel Richard W. Holden, Commander of the State Highway

Patrol. "Getting to your destina-tion safely should be your number one goal; don't try to cut off a few minutes of your drive time by speeding or driving aggressively. It's just not worth it," said Holden.

During the Thanksgiving holiday, the Patrol will also be participating in the state's "Booze It and Lose It" anti-drunk driving campaign and the national Combined Accident Reduction Effort, (C.A.R.E). Sobriety checkpoints are being held throughout the state during the entire week.

The Thanksgiving holiday week-end officially began at 6 p.m. Wednesday and ends midnight, Sunday, Nov. 30. Last year, there were 2,094 crashes, 1,174 injuries and 17 fatalities statewide during the holiday period.
