The original deadline was December 16, but students were so rushed by exams that the time limit has been extended to Jan-

uary 17 to give all an equal chance. Stories should be typed, if possible, and given to Editor Cashion before Wednesday.

Intended primarily to stimulate interest in the Proconian, the contest will result in publication of the winning story. In addition, a \$5 prize will be awarded to the winner.

Stories will be judged on the basis of originality, grammatical correctness, and clarity. Miss Manci will read the stories for mechanical errors, and they will be judged by a faculty committee. Stories may be humorous or serious; that will not affect the decision of the judges.
