

P.-T. A. Meeting Held

The second P.T.A. meeting of this school year was held in the elementary school auditorium last week.

It was officially announced last week that the Chapel Hill High School girls' and boys' basketball teams had accepted a bid to participate in the Burlington Invitation Basketball Tournament to be played at Elon College, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, March 8, 9, and 10. The announcement was made jointly by Superintendent A. W. Honeycutt and Coaches Bud Stanbach and Mary Jane Lloyd.

Although the official draw for the tournament has not been made public, it is reported that the boys' team will probably be top seeded because of its impressive won-lost record. The procedure to be followed in the tournament will be the customary round-by-round elimination. Therefore, for either Wildcat team to win the tourney they will have to take consecutive victories on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights.

This will mark the second year in a row that a Chapel Hill High School team has played in a post-season tourney. It will be remembered that last year the Hillian boys advanced to the State semi-finals (Class "B") only to drop two straight heart-breakers to a powerful Sanford five. This will be the first year, though, that a Chapel Hill High girls' team has ever played in any kind of tournament.

Coaches Lloyd and Stanbach stated last week that they were confident that win or lose their charges would make a competent showing. On the other hand, both coaches stated that they were very anxious not only to make a good showing, but also to bring home to Chapel Hill its first tournament victory in the history of

The end of a successful series of parties came last Friday night when Chapel Hill High played its last home game. The practice of entertaining visiting teams opened early in the season with a square dance in the Tin Can for the Hillsboro team and has continually improved throughout the season. The last few parties have been held in the Recreation Center where entertainment facilities are more complete.

The CHHS student council, sponsor of the informal parties, has received several letters from the visiting teams thanking the school for the fine hospitality shown by its students and faculty.

In return, CHHS teams have been entertained by Efland and Durham Central High. The Cary team was so impressed with the Recreation Center that it is investigating the possibility of establishing a center of its own.

The school feels this practice successful not only because of the entertainment it provided for CHHS students, but also because it has helped to bring the students and administration into closer contact.

Plans are being made to enable the practice to continue into the swimming and baseball seasons.
