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Native Bishop Pleads Charity In Race Issue

LEOPOLDVILLE, Belgian Congo, (NC)—The recent violence in the Congo is a warning that independence will prove a "national catastrophe" unless the people accept the "universal charity which Christ has come to place in us," Auxiliary Bishop Joseph Malula of Leopoldville has asserted.

The popular native pastor, who was elevated to the episcopate last summer, spoke over Radio Leopoldville. Expressing the hope that "the days of 1960 will be truly peaceful," he said:

"On the one hand, all Congolese are looking to the future with the hope of becoming free men who will on their own carry out the business of their country. On the other hand, at the very dawn of that independence, the cruel reality of distressing spectacles is spreading itself before our eyes. Arson, ruin and mourning are spreading panic, fear, mistrust and insecurity all over. Our Congolese society is poisoned by racial hatred, tribal division and fratricidal battles."

Asserting that 1960 will prove a "decisive year" for the young Congolese state, Bishop Malula said:

"It will be good, if at its very beginning, all of us make up our minds to love one another again. Our young Congolese state, if it wishes to progress in prosperity and in the welfare of all, must have within itself a principle of cohesion that will generate order and peace."

Biblical Notes On Catholic TV

NEW YORK (NC)—The nature of Biblical writing and its various literary forms will be explored in the second program of this month's televised "Catholic Hour," January 17.

The radio and television office of the National Council of Catholic Men, which produces the program in cooperation with the NBC-TV network, said the program will be broadcast from 1:30 to 2 p.m., EST.

Msgr. John J. Dougherty, president of Seton Hall University, South Orange, N.J., and host for the series, will stress the need for distinguishing between the use of fable and the reporting of actual events for accurate reading of the Bible.
