# Priests Lead Parishioners In Second Interfaith Rally

BALTIMORE —(NC)— Seven priests led some 175 parishioners in the picket line as Catholics joined Protestants and Jews in a second massive protest against segregated facilities at Gwynn Oak amusement park in suburban Woodlawn.

In the picket line also were 50 members of the Catholic Interracial Council of Baltimore. They carried signs which read: "All Men are Made in the Image of God," "Must Christ be crucified On 'Grim' Oak?" and "Can't We Catholics Even Play Bingo Together?"

**ANOTHER SIGN READ:** "Catholics Have Been All Too Slow..." —A quotation from the Lenten pastoral letter of Archbishop Lawrence J. Shehan of Baltimore condemning segregation and urging efforts to overcome it.

A total of 101 persons were arrested in the (July 7) demonstration, which occurred just three

days after a July 4 protest in which 283 persons were arrested. Those arrested were charged with violating Maryland's law against trespassing.

While the pickets paraded for over an hour outside the park, Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) Demonstrators in groups of 10 to 15 attempted to enter the park, had the trespass law read to them and were arrested when they refused to leave.

**POLICE DOGS** were brought in by Baltimore county police to control the crowd of several thousand white persons who heckled the 400 demonstrators whenever an arrest was made. One white woman demonstrator, Allison Turaj of Washington, D.C., was injured by a hurled rock. But she refused treatment, was arrested and taken to jail.

Five of the seven priests who took part in the demonstration are Josephites. The priests who par-

ticipated are: Father Joseph Connolly, a cochairman of the Baltimore Interfaith Committee for Human Rights and moderator of the Baltimore Catholic Interracial Council; Father Robert A. Reed, Pastor of St. Gregory the Great church; Father Henry Offer, S.S.J., pastor of St. Peter Claver parish, and his assistant, Father William McKenna, S.S.J.; Father Henry Maloney, S.S.J., pastor of St. Francis Xavier Parish, and his assistant, Father Walter Cerbin, S.S.J.; and Father John Barnett, S.S.J., Pastor of St. Pius the Fifth parish.

the Church and the world face today, it will not bypass the spiritual bond — so I sincerely hope."

The monsignor said "it is true there has been opposition to a statement on the Jews by the council out of fear that it would be misconstrued as political interference," and he conceded that this fear "is not as farfetched as it seems."

"Nor are some Jewish spokesmen without blame in this respect, without responsibility for having created or fostered this fear," he added.

Msgr. Oesterreicher said that in an article written for a Catholic magazine "an American-Jewish writer was so carried away by his 'enthusiasm' that he suggested that the council crown its work by recognizing the State of Israel."

## Hungary Okays Naming Bishops To Vacant Sees

VIENNA —(NC)— Deputy Premier Gyula Kallai of communist Hungary told newsmen here that his government will approve assignments by His Holiness Pope Paul VI of new bishops to head his country's vacant dioceses.

He said that the government's only requirement is that "the bishops respect the laws of the Hungarian state," and added:

"We have no intention of obstructing such a measure (by Pope Paul) and we are sure it will be useful."

Meanwhile, it was also reported here that improved Church-State relations was one of the topics discussed by U Thant, Secretary General of the United Nations, in his talks with Hungarian leaders during his visit there in early July.

Of Hungary's 13 Sees, seven are either vacant or have Ordinaries who are impeded in their work. Two of the three archdioceses — Eger and Kalocsa — are vacant, and the third is headed by Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty of Esztergom, now living in asylum at the U.S. legation in Budapest.

## Arabs Would Welcome Statement About Jews

NEW YORK —(NC)— Arab and Jewish organizations agreed here that they would welcome a statement from the Second Vatican Council condemning anti-Semitism.

The Arab Information Center and the American Council for Judaism issued separate comments after a report that the first session of the council put aside a condemnation for fear of antagonizing Arab states. The report later was denied.

A spokesman for the Arab League said it would welcome a clear statement against discrimination, "but distinguishing between Judaism and Jews on the one hand and the political-national Zionist-Israeli axis on the other hand."

This, said the statement "could not be viewed as offensive to the Arab states."

Clarence L. Coleman, Jr., president of the American Council of Judaism, said he had written to Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate in the United States, saying that such a statement "would evoke the strong moral endorsement of Christians, Moslems and Jews."

Misgiving based on fear of antagonizing the Arab states, he said, stem from a "serious misconception" concerning "the relationship of Judaism and Jews to Zionism and the State of Israel."

# Council's Central Commission Completes Review of Projects

VATICAN CITY — (Radio, NC) — The Central Coordinating Commission of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council has held its third session and completed its review of the projects to be submitted to the council when it reconvenes on September 29.

Also discussed was a proposal for improving press services during the council's second session.

**THE SESSION** was presided over by the commission president, Amleto Cardinal Cicognani, Papal Secretary of State. All cardinal members of the commission save Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, were present. Also attending was Archbishop John J. Krol of Philadelphia, who is an undersecretary of the commission. The session was to have been held in June but was postponed because of the death of Pope John XXIII.

During the first meeting the commission reviewed two projects, one on the missions and the other on the sacrament of Matrimony.

The project on the missions was introduced by Carlo Cardinal Confalonieri, Secretary of the Sacred Consistorial Congregation, a member of the central commission, in the presence of Gregorio Cardinal Agagianian, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, and Archbishop Pietro Sigismondi, Secretary of the same congregation. Both are

top officials of the council Commission for the Missions.

**THE PROJECT** on matrimony was introduced by Benedetto Cardinal Aloisi Masella, Chamberlain of the Holy Roman Church, in the presence of the secretaries of the three council bodies that helped to draft it — the Theological Commission, the Commission for the Discipline of the Sacraments and the Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity.

At its second meeting of the session, the Central Coordinating Commission studied a synthesis of the final chapters of the project on the nature of the Church (de Ecclesia). The revised version of the project was presented by Leo Cardinal Suenens, Archbishop of Malines-Brussels. Michael Cardinal Browne, O.P., Vice President of the Theological Commission, and Father Sebastian Tromp, S.J., Secretary of the same commission, assisted in the presentation.

**CARDINAL SUENENS** then reported on the work done by the mixed commission composed of members of the Theological Commission and the unity secretariat on revising the parts of the proj-

ect on the nature of the Church in which the two bodies have a mutual interest. Fernando Cardinal Cento, president of the Commission on Communications Media and the Lay Apostolate, and Msgr. Achille Glorieux, secretary of the same commission, joined in the presentation.
