## New Administrative Head Begins Work at Orphanage

Oxford—In a May 14 letter to the lodges of North Carolina Grand Master William L. Mills, Jr. announced the employment of John E. Ferguson as administrative head of Oxford Orphanage. Already working on the Orphanage campus part-time (on his own time), Ferguson will assume full-time duties about the middle of June.

He called the two "unsung heroes" at the Orphanage during the past quarter of a century.

The Grand Master wrote that Ferguson has for several years been principal of a junior high school here, and said of him:

## Over 1500 Masons Gather For 187th GL Annual Meet



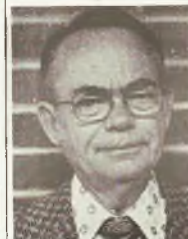
