

This Is Our New Grand Master

Near the close of the 193rd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina, on April 16, 1980, Everette Stansil Aldridge was elected and installed Grand Master of Masons in North Carolina. He is North Carolina's 127th Grand Master.

Born October 20, 1932, Stan Aldridge was one of four children born to Mary Swaringen Aldridge and the late William S. Aldridge, Sr. He grew up in Albemarle and attended the public schools there. He continued his education at the Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science, graduating in 1955.

Returning to Albemarle, he purchased interest in Stanly Funeral Home, Inc. Eleven years later, upon the retirement of two senior stockholders, he acquired majority stock in the corporation and continues as its head.
