HUGE SUPPORT RALLIES FOR EQUALLITY LAW

OVER 1,300 NEGRO AND WHITE RESIDENTS OF CHAPEL HILL RECENTLY SIGNED INDIVIDUAL PETITIONS URGING THE TOWN BOARD OF ALDERMEN TO ENACT A PUBLIC ACCOMMODATIONS ORDINANCE.

A PAID ADVERTISEMENT WAS INSERTED IN THE C. APEL HILL WEEKLY BY ALMOST 200 FACULTY MEMBERS OF THE UNITERSITY, INCLUDING DEAN OF THE LAW SCHOOL HENRY BRANDIS JR, SUP PORTING PASSAGE OF THE LAW. PREVIOUSLY, THE MAYOR'S HUMAN RELATIONS COMMITTEE AND THE MAYOR'S COMMITTEE ON INTEGRATION RECOMMENDED THAT ALL CHAPEL HILLBUSINESSES BE REQUIRED BY LAW TO SERVE ALL ORDERLY PERSONS REGARDLESS OF RACE.

SPOKESMEN FORTHE CHAPEL HILL COMMITTEE

FOR OPEN BUSINESS, WHO INITIATED THE PUBLIC CAMPAIGN, NOW ESTIM-ATE TRAT IT WILL PRODUCE SIGNED SUPPORT FROM MORE THAN 1,500 RESIDENTS.

THE REV. TOM DAVIS, WHO DIRECTED THE PROJECT, ESTIMATED THAT SIXTY-FIVE PERCENT OF THE SIGNERS ARE REGISTERED VOTERS

ALL PUBLIC ACTIVITIES OF THE COM-MITTEE FOR OPEN BUSINESS WERE HALTED FOR ELEVEN DAYS ON MONDAY, JULY 22.

THE DECISION TO STOP ALL PROTESTS UNTIL AUGUST 1 WAS REACHED AFTER THREE DAYS OF PROVATE TALKS WITH LEADING CITIZENS OF THE TOWN. THE C.O. 3. WAS ASSURED THAT REALISTIC NEGOTIATIONS WOULD BEGIN DURING THE MORATOR1UM AND PROGRESS REPORTS GIVEN TO C.O.B. LEADERS.

IT WAS ANNOUNCED THAT THE REPORTS WILL BE EVALUATED AT A COB MASS MEETING ON AUGUST 1 AT 8:00 PM IN ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH ON ROSEMARY STREET. THOSE PRESENT WILL DECIDE THE FUTURE AGTIVITIES OF THE COB.
