CIGARETTE MOTHERS WILL LOSE BABIES

Chicago, Sept. 23.—(A.P.)—Sixty percent of all the babies born of cigarette-smoking mothers die before they reach the age of two, due primarily to nicotine poisoning, Dr. Charles L. Barber, of Lansing, Mich., told the Annual Convention of the American Association for Medico-physical Research.

"A baby born of a cigarette-smoking mother is sick," he declared. "It is poisoned and may die within two weeks of birth. The post mortem shows degeneration of the liver, heart and other organs."

Editorial Comment:—Some folks are gradually committing suicide. Smoking is neither wholesome nor sanitary. Every cigarette smoked is a tack driven in the coffin. "Abstain from all appearances of evil."
