After serving as County Superintendent of Pamlico County for two years, he came to Hyde County in 1937 and has served here for six years. The schools have made quite a bit of progress under his superintendency. He has been actively engaged in every progressive movement in the county. Mr. Gallop was instrumental in organizing the Hyde County Fair Association, the Hyde County Chamber of Commerce and the Swanquarter Lions Club.

Superintendent Gallop has also devoted much time to the work of fraternal organizations in Hyde County as a Mason, Scottish Rite and Shriner, and as an Odd Fellow.

Mr. Gallop is also the dynamo behind the forthcoming celebration of the 230th anniversary of Hyde County by a homecoming celebration May 8-11.
