The RHS Rockets opened the '66 season by defeating the Halifax County Comets in Halifax on September 2. A large crowds saw the Rockets pounce on a Halifax fumble on the opening kickoff and several plays later, quarterback Johni Blanks scored his first of three touchdowns by going over from the one.
