## Let Accident Mar Happy Holiday

Christmas eve. And the most sacred of each year this joyous season some of the king of highway carnage Motor Vehicle Inspector Edward Scheidt said.

"Traffic authorities urge car owners to equip their cars for safe winter driving — making sure tires are in good shape, carrying tire chains for use when needed, replacing streaking windshield wiper blades, keeping batteries up, gas tanks full and engine tuned; yet hundreds of drivers become stranded in snow or ice because they failed to heed safety advice," he added.

"No Christmas will be a merry one if it's marred by accident. Drive carefully!"

### GOING HOME? DRIVE WITH CARE

Going home for Christmas? To be sure you get there, drive a safe car and drive it safely, so advises Motor Vehicles Commissioner Edward Scheidt.

"Whether you are a college student bound for home and the holidays in an older car, or you are taking your family to visit relatives in a nice compact or standard car, make certain the vehicle you drive is maintained in A-1 shape for any winter weather or road hazards," Scheidt recommended.

"Brakes, lights, windshield wipers, heater-defroster are among the items that should be inspected before your trip," he added.

"Save gas by giving your engine a warm up before driving in frigid weather. Avoid racing starts and sudden stops not only to save gas, but to save trouble that will arise from spinning and skidding.

"Don't use parking lights for driving lights at any time. Keep at least a vent or rear window partially open to allow fresh air to enter your car, thus preventing drowsiness."

Scheidt further advised motorists to carry reinforced tire chains, ready for use when needed during severe weather conditions and avoid causing dangerous traffic tie ups or skid wrecks.

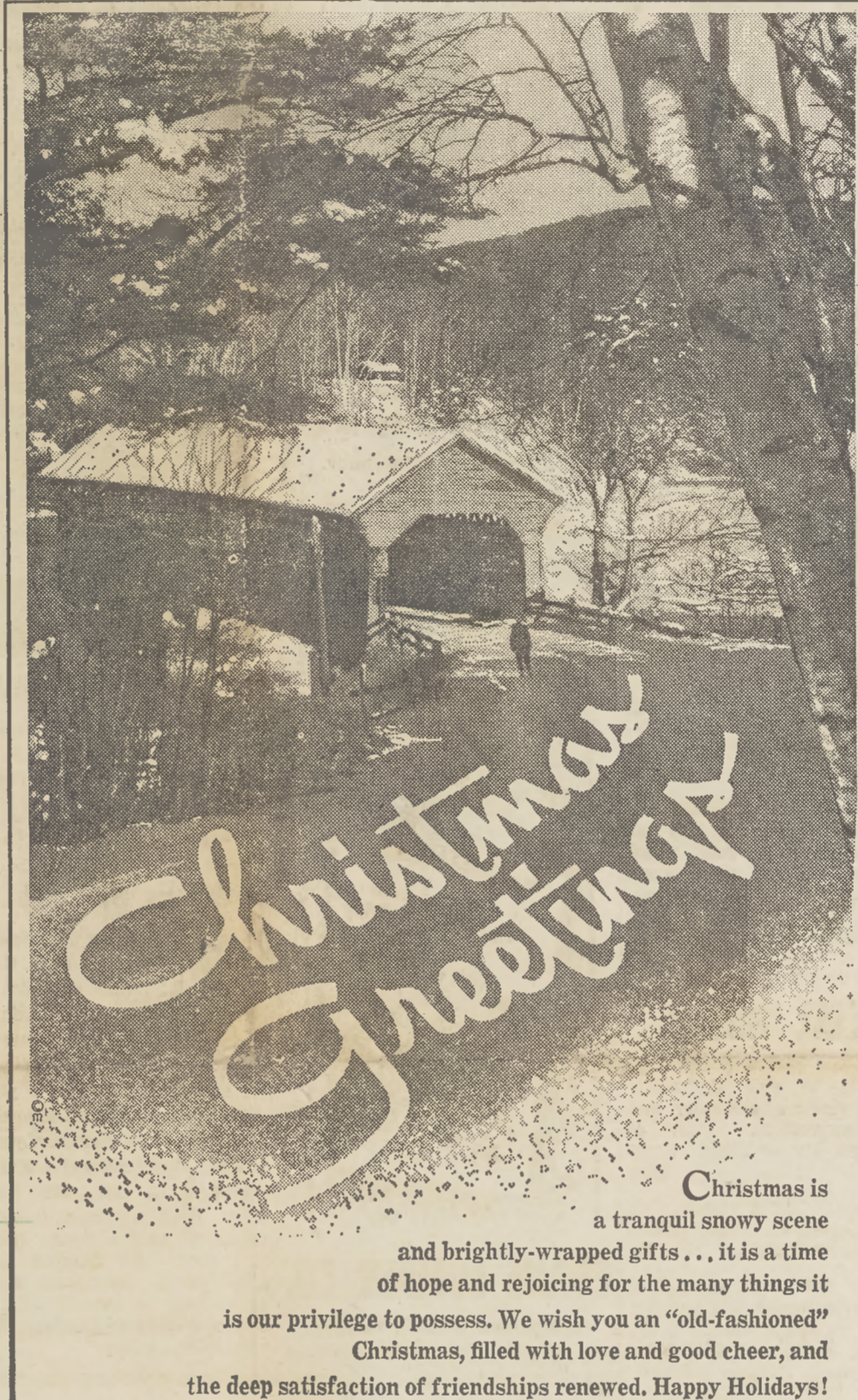
