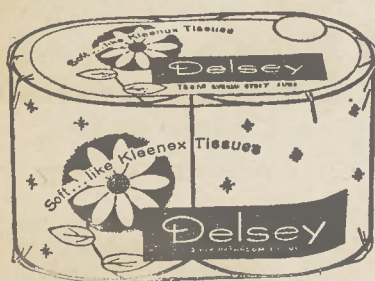

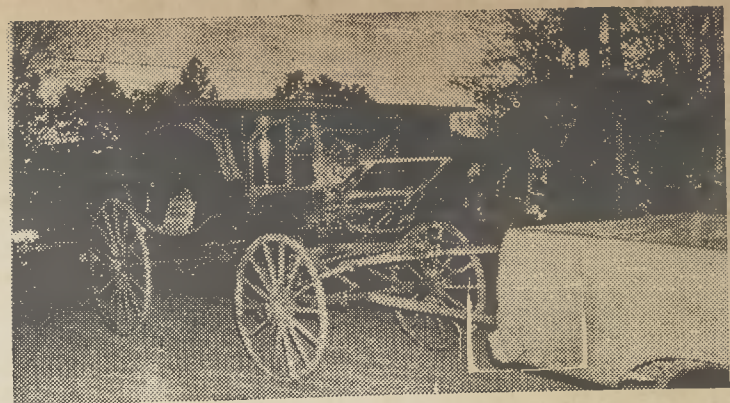

There's nothing new kissing tradition, except There was a time when time a maiden was kissed the mistletoe. When were gone, so too, was privilege.

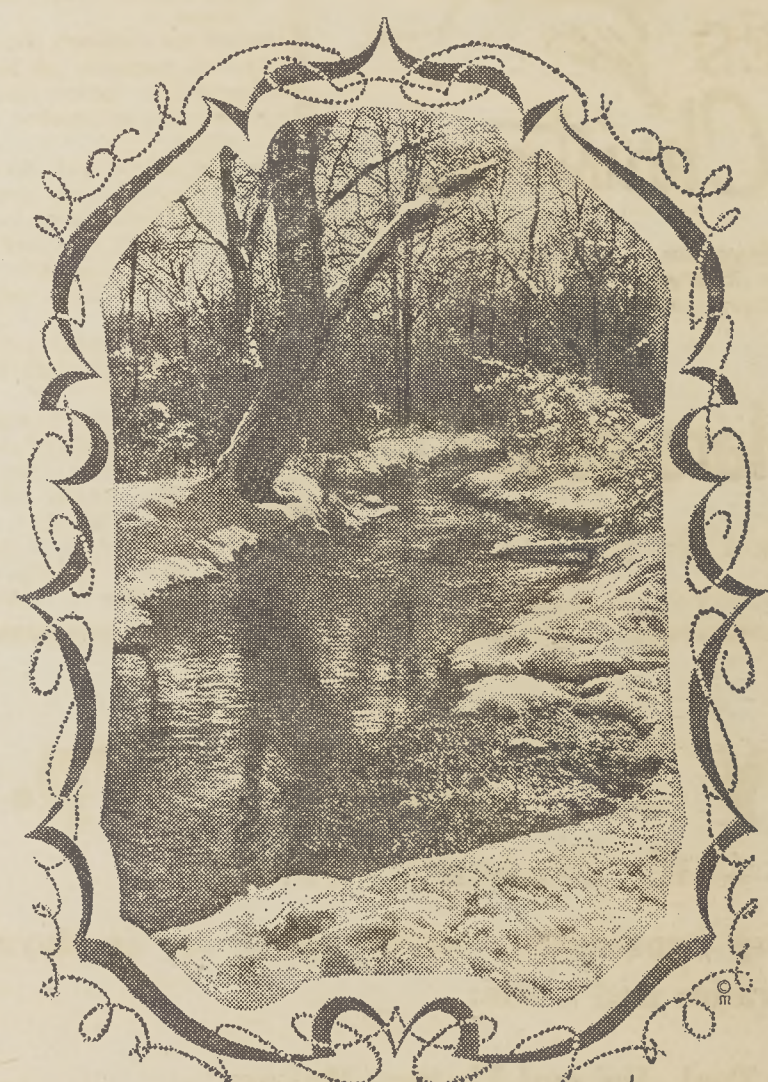

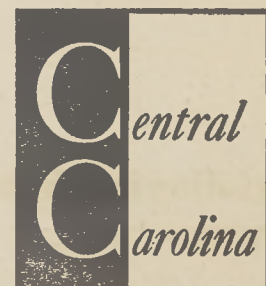
