A RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF ROLESVILLE, N. C. CALLING A REGULAR ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING A MAYOR AND (FIVE) 5 MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF ROLESVILLE, N. C., THAT in accordance with the General Laws of the State of North Carolina, THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS hereby calls for an election to be held in the TOWN HALL on Tuesday, May 4, 1965, the same being Tuesday after the first Monday in May, The date established by law for said election. Said election shall be conducted for the purpose of electing a Mayor and 5 Commissioners by the voters of the Town of Rolesville, N. C. The Mayor and each Commissioner shall be elected to hold office for a term of 2 years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.
