Liberace and his entire musical show will appear in Raleigh, November 10th, in Memorial Auditorium.

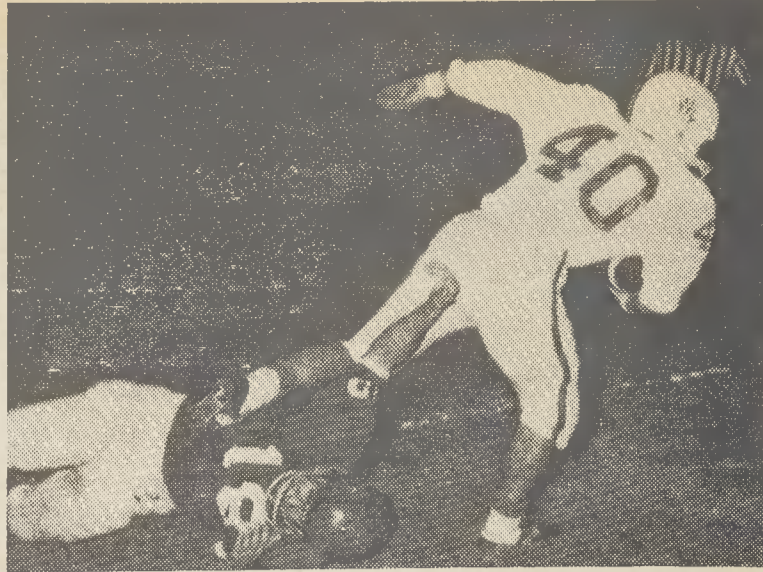

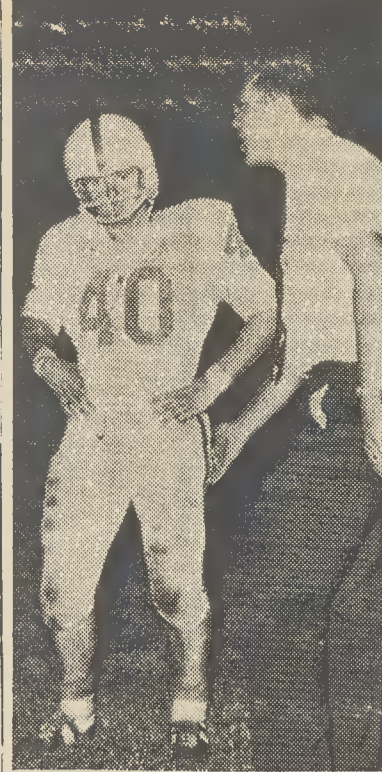

Rolesville Garment Begins Moving Into New Building

According to Vernon Massey, manager of the Rolesville Garment Company, two 100 ft. cutting tables have been set up in the new building and two employees are already at work in their new quarters.

Up until the last two weeks, all cutting of the garments was done elsewhere since space in the temporary quarters of the Masonic Building did not allow for the large tables. Now the garments are cut here in Rolesville and taken over to the Masonic Building for sewing. Massey says they are now cutting out 75 to 80 dozen pairs daily.

A Training Program was begun several weeks ago and 15 ladies are taking part in readiness for full-time employment in the new plant which will bring the employment to around 50 within a few weeks. Over a dozen new sewing machines are being set up in care of additional employees who hope to occupy the new plant in the next two weeks.
