Fathers Paro, Cou Attend Church Eve

Tuesday, November 14, the Reverends John B. Paro, S.S.E., and Joseph N. Couture, S.S.E., arrived in Selma, Alabama, in July, 1937. They were the founders and organizers of the Edmundite Southern Missions. In Selma, they found only two baptized Negro Catholics. During the past thirty years, the mission has grown and developed; it now numbers more than 300 members. The mission now has a church, a parochial school, a convent for the Sisters, a rectory for the priests, a large hospital, and an old folks' home. Several societies were organized for the welfare of the members: Boys' Club, Girls' Club, Holy Name Society for men, Saint Vincent dePaul Society to help the poor.

The thirtieth anniversary celebration took place, Thursday, Feast of Saint Edmund of Canterbury, Patron of the Edmundite Fathers. At 11:00 A.M., there was a consecrated Mass by the Reverends Eymard P. Galligan, S.S.E., John B. Paro, S.S.E., and Joseph P. Walsh, S.S.E. After the Gospel, the Very Reverend Eymard P. Galligan, the Edmundite Superior General, preached. He gave a brief history of the mission accomplished during thirty years and the plans for the future. The Most Reverend J. J. Toole, D.D., Archbishop of Birmingham, presided.
