Observe Eye Safety Rules

During the long winter evenings, many families spend their time watching television. These long hours of viewing may cause family members to suffer from eye weariness or strain, unless they have good viewing habits reminds, Mrs. Edith McGlamery, extension housing and house furnishings specialist, North Carolina State University extension.

She offers these tips for television viewing.

First, make sure the glass panel in front of the set is absolutely clean. Next, check for shiny objects or lights that may reflect in the television screen. If there are reflections, changing the positions of lamps near the television set may get rid of them. In other cases you may do well to move the set to another location.

Because of the brightness of the screen, you need a moderate amount of light in the room when

you watch television. Mrs. McGlamery says. It's uncomfortable for your eyes to try and adjust to the strong contrast of the bright screen and the dark room. However, soft light around the television set helps to reduce the contrast between screen and room, she points out.

Ask family members to sit a distance from the screen; so they're not looking up at it. Also try to locate chairs so the viewer won't have to look at the screen from an angle.

Although some persons try to sew or read while they watch television, this is not recommended. It is hard on the eyes to focus from a distant object to a closer one and back to a distant object.

Help yourself and other family members enjoy television by eliminating those things that cause eye-strain, Mrs. McGlamery advises.
