The Human Rights Campaign Fund is looking for well-organized, enthusiastic and assertive individuals nationwide to become "Area Canvass Supervisors" in the next stage of development for the highly successful <u>Speak Out</u> program. <u>Speak Out</u> is HRCF's program to generate

<u>Speak Out</u> is HRCF's program to generate timely constituent mail to federal legislators prior to votes on issues of importance to the lesbian and gay community. In less than a year, <u>Speak Out</u> has become the most successful grassroots program in the history of the gay and lesbian rights movement. "As the program has grown, we realize that much of the work involved can best be done at the local level, rather than from our Washington, DC headquarters," commented Tim McFeeley, HRCF's Executive Director. "With Area Canvass Supervisors in regions throughout the country, we should be able to more thoroughly reach out to lesbians and gays who want to participate," he said.
