

UNCA's first gay and lesbian studies conference, "Queer Geographies: Community and Place in History," will be held March 27-28 on the UNCA campus. The conference is sponsored by UNCA's Office of Academic Affairs, GLARE, and UNCA's Sociology Department.

Noted writer Frank Browning, author of five books including the recent "A Queer Geography: Journeys Toward a Sexual Self," will be the keynote speaker. Browning's talk will be held at 8 p.m. March 27 in Humanities Lecture Hall. Browning's articles and essays have appeared in the Washington Post,
